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Meet with an Advisor

Econ Advisors and College Counselors are here to support you!



Enrollment Passes

First and Second Pass

First Pass: Can enroll in up to 10 units

- Should be used for major courses, prerequisites, and courses that have limited space/offerings

Second Pass: Can enroll in 9 additional units (19 units total)

- Should be used for GE's and general elective courses, courses for which you have a PTE, and contract courses

Priority Pass

Priority enrollment is given to specific student populations including: Regents Scholars, qualified veterans, NCAA athletes, foster youth in GSP, and some students served by CAE

- If you fall into one of these populations, please consult the corresponding office for questions



Econ Enrollment Restrictions

Class Standing

Econ 11, Econ 41, and MGMT 1A require sophomore standing to enroll

- Sophomore standing means you have completed 45+ units (including AP and transfer units)

Major Status

Econ 41 is the only pre-major course that is restricted to pre-Econ and pre-Bus Econ majors

Econ 106 courses are restricted to declared Bus Econ majors on First Pass, and declared Econ or Math/Econ majors on Second Pass



Econ Enrollment Restrictions

Prerequisites

Many pre-major and UD Econ courses have prerequisite courses that must be completed (or in-progress) before you are able to enroll in the course

- Ex. To enroll in Econ 101, you must have completed Econ 11 with a C or higher, or have Econ 11 currently in-progress
- Prerequisites are listed on Class Planner, Schedule of Classes, and our website
- Check out the quarterly Enrollment Guide posted to our Bruin Learn site

Corequisites

Corequisites are courses that must be taken together

- If you plan to enroll in an UD Econ course which has a corequisite lab component, you **MUST** also enroll in the lab if the lab is offered that term
- Ex. If you plan to enroll in Econ 106V, you must also enroll in Econ 106VL
 - *Note that you must enroll in the course first, then the associated lab

Scheduling Tips

- 3 classes per quarter is typical, sometimes may need 4
 - Recommended to only take one Econ pre-major course per quarter
 - Recommended to take no more than 2 UD Econ courses per quarter
- Check for overlapping final exams! Accommodations will not be made for Economics courses

Long Term Planning

Creating a long-term plan is a great way to make sure you stay on track to graduate by your degree expected term

- Make sure your plan accounts not only for your major(s) or minor(s), but also all University and College degree requirements
- Don't forget to check that you have 180 total units and 60 upper division units!
